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## A LETTER FROM OUR HEALTH OFFICER



#### Dear Board of Commissioners and Community,

The year 2021 proved to be a challenging yet rewarding time. Similar to 2020, Public Health was at the forefront of conversations and responses to the COVID-19 pandemic. In our 2020 Public Health Annual Report, we focused on how important partnerships and community cooperation were to mitigating the spread of COVID-19. This carried into 2021 as the largest deployment of a vaccine in our history occurred. We had a goal of vaccinating 70% of our population, in hopes of reaching levels of herd immunity and putting the pandemic behind us. However, as the year progressed, it became clear that the goal would not be met despite deploying mobile vaccine clinics in less vaccinated areas and working with providers to become COVID-19 vaccine-approved providers.

We might not have met our goal to vaccinate 70% of our community, and had to work with challenges early on in the deployment with vaccine supply and demand issues, but we were still able to fully vaccinate 54.2% of our community. It took a village to accomplish this huge deployment. Public Safety, Emergency Management, and Allegan County Volunteers provided resources for the COVID-19 mass vaccine events located throughout the County. The help they provided was crucial in this historic public health victory as we were able to administer as many as 1,500 doses at each mass vaccination clinic once the supply was adequate. I want to thank every person that played a part in these events; you are appreciated and saved lives.

An economically vibrant community is a healthy community. There were dedicated resources to provide technical assistance, risk mitigation assessments, and guidance to keep businesses that had cases from developing into outbreaks, and kept schools in session.

It was also important that our community had safe water and housing so we ensured all services including permits for septic, water, and soil erosion were issued throughout the 2021 year.

ACHD held routine meetings with community leaders and superintendents in order to maintain clear communication and work together as continued changes in guidance came from the Centers for Disease Control for Prevention and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. At these meetings, local data was presented along with guidance and an opportunity to provide feedback or ask questions. A newsletter was launched that included local public health topics to update our community members. We engaged businesses and medical providers to provide COVID-19 vaccines and testing to improve access and convenience.

This past year has reaffirmed my belief that it takes a village, but also brought up the need for civil and respectful discussions to effectively move forward in our goal of improving the quality of life and health for our Allegan County community. We all can learn from each other's perspectives but it needs to be done civilly and with respect, I hope you will join me in these future discussions as we recover from the COVID-19 pandemic and together build resilience within our community.

#### **ALL-STAR STAFF**

With the main priority still the COVID-19 response, staff from all divisions assisted the personal health team with contact tracing and case investigation on top of their other public health responsibilities. Staff assisted throughout the year with COVID-19 vaccination deployment at clinics and testing events provided for Allegan County residents. We are extremely proud and thankful for our team of "all-stars" working at ACHD.

#### **BUSINESSES & SCHOOLS**

Throughout the year, ACHD made assisting businesses and schools a main priority. We provided the tools and resources they needed to promote health and safety, so they could stay open. ACHD attended weekly meetings with school Superintendents to maintain a constant flow of communication and work together through COVID-19 challenges. We also worked with over 300 businesses to provide mitigation assessments and technical assistance they needed.



Allegan Public Schools (APS) honored the ACHD team with their annual "School Bell" award in 2021. This award typically goes to an outstanding teacher in the district that has gone above and beyond for the school community. APS wanted to instead recognize ACHD for the efforts put forth to the school community related to COVID-19.

The Allegan Area Chamber of Commerce awarded ACHD with their 2021 President's Award in July of 2021. This award goes to "An individual, business, or organization that has been a champion in their industry, a champion of the Allegan community, and a champion of the Allegan Area Chamber of Commerce."

#### **COMMUNITY OUTREACH**

ACHD was able to provide a record number of outreach clinics and events in 2021. These outreach events were made possible through the donation of our mobile health unit from the Gun Lake Tribe, and assistance received from volunteers, contract staff, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), HONU Management Group, the Michigan National Guard (MING), local schools, local businesses, and Allegan County Emergency Management. This outreach was mainly successful from all of the support we received.


#### CYANOBACTERIA ALGAE BLOOM IN SWAN LAKE

In August of 2021, the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) notified ACHD that sampling from Swan Lake in Allegan showed the algal toxin microcystin was present. EGLE also reported that the cyanobacteria bloom was present in all parts of the lake to varying degrees. ACHD issued an advisory and provided information to the community. Advisory signs were posted near the campground and boat launch urging people and pets to stay out of the water. The Advisory continued for Swan Lake until November 2021, when sampling conducted found no further signs of cyanobacteria bloom in the water. ACHD lifted the advisory and provided further education to the community.

#### **VECTOR BORNE SURVEY GRANT**

ACHD participated in the MDHHS Vector-Borne Survey grant again in 2021, continuing work from 2020, as vector-borne viruses continue to be emerging diseases. No invasive mosquito or tick species were found during the sampling season. Mosquitos were collected using BG-Sentinel Traps. These traps use pheromones and a fan to trap mosquitos in a small mesh net. In 2022, ACHD will be adding traps that use light and water to attract a wider and more representative sample.

433 total mosquitos collected



- The ticks collected in the 2021 sampling season were mostly found to be dog ticks (Dermacentor variabilis).
- All black legged ticks (Ixodes scapularis) were sent to the State for Lyme disease testing.
- Results are not expected back until late 2022 early 2023.

#### **GROUNDWATER STUDY OF ALLEGAN COUNTY**

Hydrosimulatics completed their comprehensive study of groundwater in Allegan County in early 2021. In preliminary findings of the study, Hydrosimulatics does not believe that Allegan County has reached the groundwater resource crisis found in Ottawa County. Some issues discovered in the report of Allegan County include significantly elevated nitrate concentrations in shallow groundwater, significantly elevated chloride concentrations in groundwater discharge areas, many sites of contamination, and "hints" of systematic decline in groundwater levels related to use trends. The Board of Commissioners (BOC) has put together a Water Study Workgroup comprised of many different stakeholders, that will dig deeper into the report to discern the current quantity and quality of Allegan County's water sources and what this may mean for the future. ## PERSONAL HEALTH

#### **COMMUNICABLE DISEASE EDUCATION**

ACHD has routinely shared best practices with the community during the COVID-19 pandemic related to slowing the spread of the virus. These practices include:

- Wearing face masks
- Frequent hand washing
- Sanitizing commonly touched surfaces
- Coughing or sneezing into elbows/tissues
- Staying home when you feel sick
- Socially distancing from others when possible

Not only have these practices helped residents add another layer of protection against COVID-19, but they also have helped prevent other communicable diseases like influenza, Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV), and other respiratory viral infections that are commonly spread from person to person.

#### **NEW STI/HIV PROGRAM TOOLS**

In 2021, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) implemented a new system called SHOARS (STI/HIV Operations and Resource System). This new system now serves as a "home base" for the state's STI/HIV programs where ACHD can request certain supplies and materials, get grant information, host training events, and more.



#### **O**SGRX340BFlex

Another improvement MDHHS implemented in 2021 is a new system for ordering and keeping inventory of all of our state funded 340B medications called SGRX340BFlex. This allows our STI/HIV staff to keep an up-to-date and fluid log of all medications within the program, and MDHHS can view this information as well. These improvements have greatly aided the program's case management and organization.

#### **VACCINATION SCHEDULING TOOL**



When the COVID-19 vaccine first became available to the public in early 2021, ACHD had many residents eager to get their vaccine for added protection against severe illness, hospitalization, and death from COVID-19. As the demand for vaccination grew, it became hard for ACHD to schedule appointments. A short-term solution was implemented using online vaccination scheduling tools, SolvHealth and Patagonia, where residents could view upcoming clinics held by ACHD and schedule their vaccine appointments. Over 7,000 appointments were made using these tools for individuals to get their COVID-19 vaccine.

## PLANNING & PREPAREDNESS

The ACHD Public Health Planning & Preparedness (PHPP) Division coordinates the public health response to natural or human-caused emergencies. These emergencies include actual or potential public health hazards, such as:

- Communicable disease outbreaks
- Environmental sanitation hazards
- Emergencies involving toxic and hazardous materials
- And other chemicals, biological and radiological incidents

The main area of focus in 2021 was the ongoing COVID-19 response, and providing educational materials and resources for the general public, businesses, and schools.



#### **COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT**

Community Health Assessment cycles happen around every 3 years. Ascension Borgess Allegan published the 2019 Community Health Needs Assessment, and Healthy Allegan County Coalition published the 2019 Allegan County Community Health Implementation Plan. Goals and objectives were developed for the Allegan County Community using this published data to identify priorities. Due to the pandemic, assessments have been delayed and we recognize that many lives have been impacted.

#### ALLEGAN COUNTY

COMMUNITY HEALTH SURVEY







In 2021, ACHD worked with Ascension Borgess Allegan and Allegan County United Way on developing the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) survey with plans to distribute it to residents in early 2022. The purpose of the CHNA for Allegan County is to identify community health issues and needs, understand the strengths of the community, and determine where resources need to go. The feedback received will be analyzed and used in the 2022 Community Health Improvement Plan.

#### ACHD NEWSLETTER DEVELOPMENT

With new information and guidance constantly being updated and shared during COVID-19, ACHD recognized a need for a direct flow of information communicated from ACHD to community members regarding public health news. ACHD implemented an email newsletter through a service called Mailchimp, that helped us send monthly public health updates to over 27,000 emails on our subscriber list each time.

What started as just COVID-19 updates now includes other public health topics and news for the public to learn about. Over 30 public health updates were sent out throughout 2021, and PHPP plans to continue providing future updates in 2022. To subscribe to the newsletter <u>click here</u>.

## RESOURCE RECOVERY

In 2021, participants voted to increase funding in many municipalities, and service delivery continued with new health and safety measures in place. #### **UNVEILING CEREMONY**



In October of 2020, the Match-E-Be-Nash-She-Wish Band of Pottawatomi Indians (Gun Lake Tribe) donated the CARES Act dollars they received to ACHD, to go toward an Allegan County Mobile Vaccination Unit. ACHD and the Gun Lake Tribe held a Donation Ceremony at Gun Lake Tribe's Public Safety Building in March 2021 to unveil the Mobile Unit. Transportation had been identified as a barrier for residents accessing care in our 2019 Community Needs Assessment, and the mobile unit will help bring our services to residents throughout the County. ACHD is extremely grateful for Gun Lake Tribe's generous donation and looks forward to all the use the mobile clinic will get!

#### **MOBILE VACCINE CLINICS**

With the mobile health unit in 2021, ACHD was able to hold over 70 pop-up COVID-19 vaccination clinics. By holding these mobile clinics, ACHD was able to vaccinate residents that may have had a harder time accessing care or traveling to other clinics. ACHD was able to build community partnerships with organizations and locations where the mobile clinics were held such as businesses, churches, schools, and community events such as the Allegan County Fair.



#### **BIG PLANS FOR THE FUTURE**

As the demand for COVID-19 vaccination clinics has decreased, ACHD is planning other outreach events in the next year where the mobile unit can be utilized such as hearing and vision screenings, STD/HIV outreach, other immunization clinics, and more! The COVID-19 pandemic has shed light on the importance and need for community outreach events for vulnerable populations and increasing access to care for Allegan County residents.

## TO OUR VOLUNTEERS

ACHD is thankful for all volunteers who have helped assist us with our COVID-19 response since March of 2020. In 2021, Allegan County vetted over 200 volunteers through our volunteer program and we implemented a volunteer sign-up genius to help assist us with the many applicants willing to volunteer with us.

Our volunteers are members of Allegan County who wanted to do whatever they could to help their fellow community members during the pandemic. Our volunteers helped provide testing resources, sign up community members for vaccination, work at vaccination clinics across the County, and so much more! ACHD appreciates every person who signed up to volunteer with us - You are amazing! Below are a few pictures of some of volunteers in action at events throughout 2021.


## FINANCIAL OVERVIEW




# REVENUE & EXPENDITURES BY YEAR


