

BACKGROUND

Access to Medical Care and Behavioral Health have been identified as 2 of 4 priority issues impacting health outcomes for residents in the 2022-2025 Allegan County Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). Allegan County stakeholders recognize that collaborative community planning is essential to improving health outcomes.

According to the <u>County Health Rankings Model</u>, which was followed when creating the 2022-2025 CHIP, Access to Care and Quality of Care has a 20% impact on community health outcomes, and Social and Economic Factors have the most significant impact on individual health outcomes at 40% (County Health Rankings, 2022). Working to address these factors will lead to better health outcomes (length of life and quality of life) for individuals in Allegan County.



County Health Rankings model

In the 2022-2025 CHIP, an action step under both Access to Medical Care and Behavioral Health is to assess local healthcare providers in Allegan County to create a compiled resource report. A similar capacity assessment report of local oral, mental health, and primary care providers was conducted in Allegan County in 2016. The survey tool used in 2016 was updated, modified, and used for this 2023 assessment.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Report Overview

The data from this report shows that access issues are impacted differently depending on the discipline (mental health, oral health, and primary care) and the individual's insurance status. All facility types surveyed showed high acceptance of new patients and a wide range of patient ages accepted. However, appointment wait times may be an issue for some patients seeking services. Overall, Oral Health has access issues with the Straight Medicaid "Adult" and uninsured population. Mental Health has issues with appointment availability on weekends/weeknights, with 79% of facilities surveyed stating they do not offer evening or weekend appointments. Primary Care also struggles with insurance acceptance, and 45% of Primary Care Providers (PCPs) surveyed said they do not offer special provisions for the underinsured. Please read the area of this report for each discipline for more information.

Data Collection Method

This survey tool was sent to 18 Oral Health, 23 Mental Health, and 20 Primary Care provider offices in Allegan County. Health Resource Advocates (HRAs) researched active provider offices in Allegan County and previous offices that participated in the 2016 assessment to recruit for survey participation. Each office was contacted to participate, and data was collected via phone or email. Qualtrics and Microsoft Excel were utilized to aggregate the data. The Oral Health provider data was collected in March 2023, the Mental Health provider data was collected in July 2023, and the Primary Care Provider data was collected in October 2023.

Data Limitations

In conducting this assessment, several data limitations were encountered that should be considered in interpreting the findings. Data from many oral, mental, and primary health care providers was unavailable for Allegan County due to not receiving responses to requests for survey participation, and the information gathered from providers who did participate did not always come directly from the provider at the office surveyed, but from other staff members of the office. Another limitation of this data was the time of year data was collected. Given that some providers were surveyed earlier in the year and some were surveyed later in the year, data/responses could have changed from the provider surveyed. Lastly, the survey tool for each provider discipline was not 100% consistent or the same for each field, so oral/mental/primary care providers may have answered some questions that other disciplines were not asked. These limitations may impact the accuracy/generalizability of the findings. While the assessment provides valuable insights, caution should be exercised in drawing definitive conclusions. It is recommended that additional assessments be conducted routinely to help address these data gaps and enhance the robustness of future assessments.


Recommendations

This survey data can help guide future community planning efforts to determine access issues from a provider perspective. **ACHD has provided some public health recommendations for oral health, mental health, and primary care providers based on the survey results.** Similar to public health recommendations offered in the 2016 assessment, these public health recommendations tie into some of the 2022-2025 CHIP cycle action steps identified to work toward the prioritized areas of Access to Medical Care and Behavioral Health. Other workgroups can consider this data and use it to develop future action steps to improve the prioritized Access to Medical Care and Behavioral Health areas.

Data to Consider

Allegan County Health Rankings data from 2022 shows a patient-to-oral healthcare provider ratio (how many patients per every oral healthcare provider) of 2,970:1, significantly higher than Michigan's average of 1,290:1 and the United States average of 1,400:1 (County Health Ranking Data, 2022).

Allegan County's percentage of the population under 65 without health insurance increased from 6% in 2018 to 8% in 2019 (County Health Ranking Data, 2022). In Allegan County, 12% of survey respondents said "insurance barriers" were one of their **top three** barriers to accessing healthcare (Allegan County Community Health Survey, 2022).




Oral Health Care providers with an office in Allegan County were contacted in March 2023 to participate in this survey. Those who preferred to take the survey online were emailed a link to the online survey with the same questions. Eighteen offices were contacted to participate in the survey. Of the 18 offices reached out to, six did not respond or declined to participate, and 1 of the offices was closed when this report was published. 11 offices participated in the survey.




All Oral Health Survey Responses: Data as of March 2023






Q2: What is the wait time for current patients to obtain an appointment? (N=11)





Q4: What is the wait time for new patients to obtain an appointment? (N=11)






Q5: Do you offer emergency appointments? (N=11)



Q6: Are emergency appointments only available for current patients? (N=9, question not applicable 2 facilities)




Q7: What is the wait time for an emergency appointment? (N=9, question not applicable to 2 facilities)




Q12: Do you have special provisions for the underinsured? (N=11)

- Yes. Care credit is available. (3)






Q15: Do you think access to primary care is an issue in Allegan County? (N=11)




Data to Consider

Allegan County Health Rankings data from 2022 shows a patient-to-mental healthcare provider ratio (how many patients per every mental healthcare provider) of 1,050:1, significantly higher than Michigan's average of 330:1 and the United States average of 350:1 (County Health Ranking Data, 2022).

In the <u>2022 Allegan County Community Health Survey</u>, Mental and Behavioral Health was listed as the **greatest** health concern. In the 2019 County Health Rankings Survey, 17% of Allegan County adults reported experiencing poor mental health for 14 or more of the last 30 days (<u>County Health Rankings Data, 2022</u>).


In the <u>2022 National Community Survey</u>, 27% of Allegan County survey respondents rated the "Availability of affordable quality mental health care" in Allegan County as "excellent" or "good".




Data Collection

Mental Health Care providers who have an office in Allegan County were contacted in July 2023 to participate in this survey. Those who preferred to take the survey online were emailed a link to the Qualtrics survey with the same questions. Twenty-three offices were contacted to participate in the survey. Of the 23 offices reached out to, 9 did not respond or declined to participate. 14 offices participated in the survey.




All Mental Health Survey Responses: data as of July 2023








Data to Consider

Allegan County Health Rankings data from 2022 shows a patient-to-primary healthcare provider ratio (how many patients per every primary healthcare provider) of 4,540:1, significantly higher than Michigan's average of 1,250:1 and the United States average of 1,310:1 (County Health Ranking Data, 2022).

In the <u>2022 National Community Survey</u>, 56% of Allegan County residents feel the availability of affordable, quality healthcare is "fair" or "poor."







Q1: What is the age range of patients you accept/see? (N=10)




Q2: What is the wait time for current patients to obtain an appointment? (N=10)





Q5: Do you offer emergency appointments? (N=10)
















Q13: Do you have interpreter services available for new and current patients? (N=10)



PUBLIC HEALTH RECOMMENDATIONS

Oral Health

Meeting Individuals in the Community

• One way to work towards the goal of utilizing non-traditional healthcare services to reach adults and youth in Allegan County could be to provide oral healthcare opportunities at community events. ACHD's mobile health clinic is available if offices want to partner at upcoming community events. Please contact healthed@allegancounty.org if interested.

Promotion of Oral Kindergarten Health Assessment

The Kindergarten Oral Health Assessment (KOHA) law [Public Health Code Act 368 Section 333.9316] was passed to ensure that children entering their first year of school are able to receive an oral health assessment (dental screening) before starting school. The KOHA Program aims to improve school readiness and raise awareness of the importance of good oral health. As 36% of facilities surveyed stated they did not know about KOHA, there is a need for increased awareness and community engagement opportunities.

Medicaid Acceptance & Provisions for the Underinsured

Almost all facilities accept new patients, but patients with Medicaid and lower income may
have trouble finding a provider. Most who stated they have "special provisions" for the
underinsured mentioned CareCredit. While CareCredit helps spread the payment out and
reduce interest, it does not lower the cost of the services. Medicaid was only accepted fully at
two of the 11 participating locations, with most facilities mentioning difficulty billing and
receiving low payments back as reasons for not accepting it. Identifying practice
improvements and considering opening up acceptance to Medicaid to assist families with
lower socioeconomic status in receiving oral care can help bridge this gap and increase
accessibility to Allegan County residents.

Evening & Weekend Appointments

• Most of the facilities do not offer weekend or evening appointments. Individuals may avoid care when they have difficulty attending weekday appointments. Those working Monday-Friday may find it difficult to find time in their work schedule to go to an appointment and may have to use PTO or sick time to make it to a routine care visit. Identifying practice improvements that could increase the accessibility of appointments for patients is recommended.

Transportation Needs

An additional barrier for individuals to seek oral health services includes transportation, as only one facility offers transportation to qualifying patients. <u>Allegan County Transportation (ACT)</u> has expanded services as of January 2022, with services available 5:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday-Friday and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturdays. ACHD recommends promoting ACT transportation services to Allegan County residents experiencing barriers. <u>Allegan County Community Action Agency</u> also offers transportation assistance to seniors needing rides to and from appointments. The promotion of services available in Allegan County can help assist residents experiencing transportation barriers to accessing oral care.

PUBLIC HEALTH RECOMMENDATIONS

Mental Health

Community Outreach and Education

- Mental health providers could engage in community outreach programs to raise awareness about mental health issues and reduce stigma while engaging in non-traditional health care services to reach individuals across Allegan County.
- Conducting educational sessions in schools, workplaces, and community centers could promote mental health awareness and the availability of services within Allegan County.

Telehealth Services

• Expanding non-traditional healthcare services, such as telehealth services, can help to reach individuals who may face barriers to in-person care, such as those in rural areas, individuals with mobility issues, or those without reliable transportation.

Collaboration with Primary Care Providers

• Collaborating with primary care providers to integrate mental health services into primary care settings and routine healthcare services by encouraging screening for mental health issues during regular medical check-ups will help facilitate communication and information sharing between mental health providers and primary care physicians to ensure comprehensive patient care.

Medicaid Acceptance

• Only 43% of mental health care providers that responded to the survey accepted Medicaid fully, with most facilities mentioning reimbursements not being sufficient as reasons for not accepting it. Identifying practice improvements and considering opening up acceptance to Medicaid to assist families with lower socioeconomic status in receiving mental health care can help bridge this gap and increase accessibility to Allegan County residents.



PUBLIC HEALTH RECOMMENDATIONS

Primary Care

Community Partnerships & Outreach

- Collaborating with local community organizations, schools, employers, and ACHD to provide healthcare information, screenings, and preventive services in community settings and outreach events can bring non-traditional healthcare services to community members who may face barriers to receiving care.
- Establishing relationships with social service agencies can help address social determinants of health that may impact access to care.
- Engaging in conducting community health screenings for conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, and infectious diseases. Using screenings as an opportunity to engage with the community and promote primary care services. Educational materials, workshops, and community outreach can help enhance health literacy for Allegan County residents.

Care Coordination and Navigation

- Improve care coordination by working closely with mental and oral health care providers.
- Provide patient navigation services to help individuals navigate complex healthcare systems and access the appropriate services. The <u>Allegan County Community Links Program</u> can assist residents in navigating health services available to them.

Extended Hours and Weekend Appointment Availability

• 60% of PCPs who responded to the survey said they do not offer weekend appointment availability. Extending clinic hours, including evenings and weekends, to accommodate individuals with busy schedules or those who cannot take time off during regular business hours can help increase accessibility to primary care services for Allegan County residents.

Transportation Needs

An additional barrier for individuals to seek primary care services includes transportation, as only one facility offers transportation to qualifying patients. <u>Allegan County Transportation</u> (<u>ACT</u>) has expanded services as of January 2022, with services available 5:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday-Friday and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturdays. ACHD recommends promoting ACT transportation services to Allegan County residents experiencing barriers. <u>Allegan County Community Action Agency</u> also offers transportation assistance to seniors needing rides to and from appointments. The promotion of services available in Allegan County can help assist residents experiencing transportation barriers to accessing primary care.
