June 14, 2024, Spring Time Story – Gun Lake County Park 10:00 am-11:00 am
Bring the little ones out to Gun Lake County Park and enjoy a story and a stroll as we find out who's waking up for spring, who's coming back, and how the animals that stayed all winter are getting ready for the new season. You may be able to meet an animal that is ready for the warmer weather. Dress to be outside the entire time.

June 27, 2024, Family Kayaking – Ely Lake Campground 6:00 pm -7:30 pm Paddle Ely Lake with naturalists from the Outdoor Discovery Center. Kayaks, paddles, and vests are provided. The group will launch from the Ely Lake beach and paddle around the shoreline. Lakes are the perfect place to learn to paddle for the first time or to get some practice in.

<u>July 15, 2024, Up Close and Wild – West Side County Park</u> 11:00 am -12:00 pm Learn about the reptiles, amphibians, and birds found in Michigan with a naturalist from the Outdoor Discovery Center. Live animals of all ages will be used in this family-friendly presentation. Time to handle some of the wildlife may be conducted during the program or at its conclusion depending on the size of the audience.

August 24, 2024, Family Kayaking - New Richmond Bridge Park 9:30 am-11:00 am Paddle the Kalamazoo River with naturalists from the Outdoor Discovery Center. Kayaks, paddles, and vests are provided. The group will launch from the New Richmond Bridge Park (north entrance) and paddle upriver into marshy areas and forested river sections. Then we will turn around and paddle back to the park. This river has a slow current making this an ideal paddle for an inexperienced paddler or someone looking for a relaxed paddle.



New Transportation Technology Deployment – Via Mobility (Software Developer) is building a new scheduling portal for transportation dispatchers to help streamline processes and improve route productivity. During the development of the new Via platform, team members at County Transportation have provided the launch team with several inputs, including an updated list of passengers, service perimeters, common points of interest, mapping data, fleet and driver information, and branding guidelines. Members of the Via launch team plan to provide training on-site towards the middle to end of February, with plans to open the Via dashboard to internal operations staff at the end of February. The customer-facing technology, including an Allegan County Transportation phone application, will allow passengers to book and cancel trips and check their trip status in real-time. **Senior Services** – The Senior Millage significantly impacted services in 2023. The primary services offered are outlined below, along with the outcomes year-to-date:

County Parks Z-Card — In 2019, the Tourist Council (TC) saw a decline in using the Inside Allegan County Visitors Guide and stopped producing the guide. The TC explored other marketing opportunities and decided to use a Z-card for marketing. The Z-card is a foldable pocket-size brochure. In 2019 the Z-card was produced with listing activities and contact information on one side and the county recreation map with information about the Allegan County Heritage Trail on the other. The Z-card has been a great success with its small size and inclusion of the county map. In an effort to increase marketing, edits were made to improve communication with our residents and visitors. QR codes were added with links to Heritage Trail, Parks, Polaris App with the ORV map (shows which county roads can be driven on), Tourism websites, and local webcam links. 

### **Operations**

**Broadband Project** (Last Updated on 11/15/23) – 123NET jumped into action to connect a customer on 12<sup>th</sup> Street in Shelbyville, making the Zandbergen family the first in Michigan to connect to the internet leveraging ROBIN funds. 123NET and Allegan County hosted a joint press conference and community open house on November 13, 2023, at the Hopkins Middle School cafeteria.

123NET has contracted with Verita Corp for the initial zone - FDA05. Verita began working in December, but was shut down 7 working days this month, only working 6 days due to the snowstorm and freezing weather. There are 9 crews working with 4 drilling machines in the initial zone. More crews are expected soon. Zone FDA05 has been divided into 13 builds. 123NET expects to begin connecting additional customers in early February.

Nineteen (19) total miles of conduit have been placed, which is still statistically 0% complete considering the total number of fiber miles is over 1,100. **Courthouse Flagpole & Historical Sign** (Last Updated on 12/28/23) – Although delayed due to weather, relocation of the flagpole, historical sign, and memorial cherry blossom tree is progressing. On January 22, 2024, the memorial tree was relocated to a temporary holding area at the County's landscaper property for safekeeping. After removal, the pole and sign will be housed in a storage container until they can be repositioned when the grounds are more conducive. Public Safety Radio Coverage Testing in Allegan County Schools — Following a request for proposal process carried out by the County on behalf of the Allegan Area Educational Services Agency (Allegan Area ESA), the County has signed an agreement with a contractor to conduct testing of public safety radio signal strength within Allegan County school buildings. Large building structures often attenuate radio signals, which can lead to a loss of radio communication among first responders and with Allegan County Central Dispatch during incident response. The County has installed in-building radio signal amplification systems at the Sheriff's Office and the Courthouse to address this issue. Allegan Area ESA will provide funding to test all 40 school buildings. Pricing and testing information will also be shared with all other non-Allegan Area ESA schools so they may contact the contractor to have their school tested. Coverage testing is to be completed by spring. ### **Operations**


Courthouse Construction and Renovation (Last Updated on 1/11/24) – On January 10, 2024, a discussion was held between the County, Judicial Council, and Construction Contractor to discuss any impacts the project may have on court functions. As with all construction projects, there is anticipated to be a combination of noisy activities (ex. saw cutting, jackhammering, etc.) and typical construction noises (ex., wall assembly, HVAC, drywalling, carpeting installation, painting). Per the bid process, the contractor agreed to limit high-decibel noisy activities between 7:00 AM – 9:00 AM. All other activities are classified as typical construction noise and allowable through the business day. To assist the courts when certain activities adversely affect court operations, the County has offered to set up an alternate courtroom in a different building ahead of this activity for the courts to migrate to during these times. During the meeting, court administrators were encouraged to connect with the Executive Director of Operations to discuss this opportunity and develop appropriate needs within an alternate space. The next step in this discussion is to finalize the construction timeline with the trade vendors (i.e., plumbing, electrical, framing, demolition) and align that to the established court schedule.

Over the next two weeks, grounds on the southeast corner of the Courthouse will begin to experience demolition and site preparation work for the new addition. One initial task will be removing the landscaping and trees adjacent to the Courthouse (pictured below).





County Services Building Renovation (Last Updated on 1/11/24) – Demolition work on the County Services Building (CSB) continues progressing. As a reminder, employees may use the northeast door or main entrance to access the building. The northwest door will only be restricted to construction work access or safety and security. There has been no disruption to the public access point.



#### **Financial**

West Michigan Regional Veteran's Treatment Court Grant Update — West Michigan Regional Veterans Court recently celebrated its 50th Program Graduate. This was made possible because of the grant funds awarded to the District Court. Veteran's Treatment Court focuses on promoting sobriety, recovery, and stability through drug court and mental health court principles to veterans who have become involved in the criminal justice system as a result of issues that developed while on a tour of duty or as a result of trauma.

**Highway Safety Funding** – The County's commitment to highway safety is realized through two key initiatives: 1) Highway Safety Grant Patrol and 2) Secondary Road Patrol. These programs target impaired driving, speeding, seat belt compliance, and distracted driving enforcement. In 2023, the grant funding supported 172.5 hours of highway safety patrol and three full-time deputies for secondary road patrol. The result of a remarkable 50% reduction in fatal crashes, dropping from 22 incidents in 2022 to 11 in 2023.

These grants play a crucial role in enhancing the safety of motorists in Allegan County, showcasing tangible outcomes that directly benefit the community.

## Purpose

#### What is a Community Health Improvement Plan?

A community health improvement plan (CHIP) is a long-term, systematic effort to address public health problems based on the results of Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) activities and the community health improvement process. A community health improvement process uses data from the Community Health Needs Assessment to identify priority issues, develop implementation strategies for action, and establish accountability to ensure measurable health improvement. The purpose of the Community Health Improvement Plan is to help our entire county track the progress we make towards a healthier community. Similar to the Whole Child framework for education, the CHIP encompasses partnerships amongst our community in order to provide sustainable supports and resources to individuals in need.

#### Why is this CHIP important?

The public health challenges that our community faces are too large for one person, organization, school, or sector to fix alone. The Allegan County CHIP will act as a roadmap to help all sectors of our community collaborate to address the priority areas identified in Allegan County. This CHIP was created by involving different perspectives and voices from the community to help us fill gaps in services and health needs and strive towards a healthier Allegan County across the lifespan.

#### What is in this plan?

In this plan, the prioritized areas identified for Allegan County are explained, with objectives and recommended strategies and action steps for each of the prioritized areas given.



ACHD continues working with their vendor, Polco, to finalize the Limited Behavioral Risk Factor Survey, now known as the Allegan County Community Health Survey. This name change occurred for marketing and communication efforts around the survey. The new name ideally helps all of Allegan County understand the survey's intent, which is to gain first-hand insight from our community members on the successes and challenges that impact the community's health. This data will help the community identify health areas to focus on that will improve Allegan County. The ACHD anticipates a draft of the report in Q1 of 2024.








# **ZONE STATUS - 123NET**


