A Note From the Administrator

During the October 10th Board of Commissioners Meeting, I had the privilege of presenting a recommended balanced budget, which was adopted as proposed. The budget is the result of collaboration with many individuals who contributed to the final product and kept the Board engaged in its development over several months. I am particularly pleased with the extensive planning that comprises the budget, including multi-year operational plans, 20+ year capital plans, vehicle plans, compensation, grants, fees, and overall strategic plans. Staying proactive through planning allows us to look ahead with vision and be prepared for various scenarios while keeping our long-range goals progressing. Recently, the County received confirmation of its AA bond rating, affirming its strong policies and management.



I am enthusiastic about the customer service enhancements moving forward at the County. We held an Open House for the renovated County Services Building and received several positive comments about the direct and efficient layout for customers. Even though we had to work through some challenges to finalize the plan, I am pleased that the Treasurer and Drain Services will soon be available at the County Services Building. I look forward to collaborating with these offices.

The Well and Septic Grant Program is now underway in partnership with Community Action of Allegan County (CAAC). This program will provide financial assistance to repair or replace well and septic systems to improve water quality and availability in Allegan County. Services

12th Annual Allegan County Veteran Stand Down – Allegan County, in partnership with the Veterans Administration (VA), served over 90 veterans through a free community event on Thursday, October 17, 2024, at the First Baptist Church in Allegan (pictures below). Stand Down is a resource event for veterans featuring local, state, and federal resources and nonprofit services available for veterans and their families. This year's event featured over 35 service vendors, a hot meal, a military surplus, and great comradery. Free Ride to the Polls – To eliminate transportation barriers for voters, the County offers subsidized (free) rides now through November 5 for riders participating in early voting, dropping off ballots at drop boxes, and voting in person on Election Day. This service is available for residents living in Allegan County. To set up a ride, call the scheduling office at (269) 673-4229 by noon the day before travel is needed to arrange transportation; no ID is required. When calling, please provide travel details, including the polling location (drop-off/destination) and drop and pickup times. Trips to polling locations will be co-mingled with other scheduled trips. Please allow a half-hour pick-up window for both pick-up and return trips. For a list of early voting locations, ballot drop boxes, and polling sites, visit Michigan.gov/vote. Resource Recovery Program, Hazardous Waste Event – The Resource Recovery Program held its final hazardous waste event for the year on October 5, 2024, at the Otsego Department of Public Works. The event was open to all residents within Allegan County, and 164 cars dropped off items at this collection. Of those 164 cars, 92 belonged to various townships that could not participate in the past due to non-participation within the program. Allegan City, Otsego City, and Plainwell City comprised most of the 92 cars. Many of these participants expressed gratitude for being eligible for this service. Services

Animal Shelter Seizure – On October 1, Animal Control Officers brought in an emaciated dog, one of five on the loose from the same location. A deputy had been investigating this house for several months. After documenting the dog's medical status with pictures, the deputy sought a warrant to seize the remaining dogs in the home. On October 3, a team went to the house to obtain the remaining 13 dogs from the home.

The 14 dogs from the seizure, 4 surrenders resulting from death, and 3 strays, all on the same day, were taxing on the facility and staff. There was an immediate need for volunteers and consumable items, such as towels, blankets, leashes, harnesses, treats, and temporary kennels. After sharing these needs on social media, the community stepped in and provided many donations. The County received over \$4,000 in donations, new and used items ranging from dog kennels, towels, blankets, leashes, harnesses, assorted food and treats, and more. In the first initial days of intake, partners at Wishbone provided 12 additional volunteers for 20 on Saturday to help clean and exercise animals for 160 hours over 4 days. Six new foster homes opened up their homes to create more space and reduce stress. There are 18 dogs from 3 court holds now receiving food, medical treatment, and improved quality of life.

Transportation Outreach — On October 5, County Transportation was represented at the Wayland Expo, an annual event that draws a crowd of over 500 individuals. Transportation ended a busy season of outreach events by providing transportation at the Fennville Goose Fest, which took place from October 10-13, 2024. Transportation was offered during the event, with approximately 65 individuals taking advantage of the opportunity to utilize the bus to get to and from this event. Operations

Courthouse Construction (Last Updated on 9/13/24) – Interior framing and drywall work is progressing. At this point, the project is still on track to be completed by December 31, 2024.





Finishing work has begun in the Friend of the Court and Probate Court office suites, with anticipated completion by November 8, 2024. The office should be fully restored before the Thanksgiving holiday. Renovation work is also well underway in the former Register of Deeds office to prepare for the Clerk's and Vital Records offices to relocate once completed. Provided no delays are experienced in furniture acquisition, both offices should be moved into their new space by December 20, 2024. The County is working closely with all offices to coordinate timelines and resource needs to help this transition go as smoothly as possible for the staff and customers.

As this renovation sequence approaches completion, the construction teams will start pivoting to the next spaces in sequence, the current Treasurer and Clerk offices. As the Treasurer's office is relocated to the County Services Building (11/6 - 11/15), staggered demolition will begin in this space, followed shortly afterward by the Clerk's Office once they are moved into their new space several weeks later.

Operations

Broadband Project (Last Updated on 7/3/24) – 123Net has 1021 Active customers and 228 customer installations pending. Zone status is as follows:

- Zones 5, 9 and 10 are complete
- Zone 11 conduit and fiber are in, 113 of 541 addresses are tested and released for ordering.
- Zone 1 conduit 77% complete; fiber 23% complete. Cabinet has power.
- Zone 7 conduit 5%

Conversations continue with the Drain Office to solidify their move-in schedule. 




CONDUIT MILES

FIBER MILES FIBER PERCENTAGE


ZONE MAP - 123NET





Revenue Highlights:

Total revenues through September are up \$6.7M as compared to last year at this time. The driving force behind that increase is:


- General Fund (up 11% or \$3.20M)
- Indigent Defense Fund (up 36% or \$1.47M)
- Liability Sinking Fund (up 55% or \$2.33M)
- Health Department Fund (up 15% or \$659K)



Expense Highlights:


Total expenses through September have increased by \$9.6M as compared to last year at this time. This reflects an increase of 11.14%. The three funds that are driving this increase are Capital Improvements (up \$4.2M), General Fund (up \$3.9M), and American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Fund (up \$2.9M).


- Capital Improvements includes renovation work on both the Courthouse and County Services Building.
- General Fund includes \$5.53M in transfers that are the related to the distribution of Fund Balance surplus as per the Budget Policy.




General Fund Highlights:


