

ALLEGAN COUNTY 9-1-1 AMENDED SERVICE PLAN

PURPOSE

To aid in the establishment of a universal emergency number service system or "9-1-1". This system will provide the ability to reach a Public Service Answering Point by only dialing the three digits of 9-1-1.

This service plan is being submitted for approval to establish a 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Service Allegan County.

ALLEGAN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS AUTHORITY

Under the provisions of Section 301 (1) of Michigan Public Service Act 32 of 1986 the County Board of Commissioners are given the authority for establishing an Emergency Telephone Service District within the county. To establish an Emergency Service District and to cause 9-1-1 service to be implemented the Board of Commissioners shall first adopt a tentative 9-1-1 service plan by resolution.

The tentative plan was adopted on June 13, 1989 and the Allegan County Emergency Telephone Service District was established.

Public Hearing

The public hearing for the original plan was held on Tuesday, September 12, 1989.

Tentative Amended Plan and Public Hearing

The County Board of Commissioners adopted the Amended plan on June 9th, 1994. The public Hearing for the amended plan will be held September 22, 1994.

COUNTY CLERK
Duties

Within five (5) days after the adoption of a resolution authorizing the Tentative Plan the county clerk shall forward a copy of the resolution, a copy of the tentative plan 9-1-1 service plan, by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the clerk or other appropriate official of each agency located within the 9-1-1 district of the 9-1-1 service plan.

The clerk of each county which has adopted a tentative service plan shall give notice of the hearing. This notice will be published twice in a newspaper of general circulation within the county, with the first being at least 30 days prior to the date of the hearing. This notification will give the Location, Date and Time of the hearing as well as a description of the boundaries as determined at the expiration of the time of for filing a notice of exclusion from the 9-1-1 service district.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The tentative plan contains information which will assist local public safety agencies, political jurisdictions and telephone service providers with the implementation of this service plan.

EMERGENCY TELEPHONE SERVICE DISTRICT

This Plan hereby creates an operational service district that is coterminous with the borders of Allegan County. The Plan creates a technical service district including the following townships, cities and villages in Allegan County and the following townships in Barry County and Kalamazoo County.

At the present time there are in excess of 32 seven (7) digit telephone numbers used by Allegan County citizens in order to summon emergency aid. With the implementation of a county wide 9-1-1 number this is reduced to only ONE! Any agency which receives regular business, non-emergency, telephone calls would be encouraged to retain their seven (7) digit telephone number and directory listing. This would not only allow for receipt of non-emergency calls but would also provide a backup number should the 9-1-1 system become inoperative.

The Service Plan will provide an Enhanced 9-1-1 system including:

Automatic Number Identification
Automatic Location Identification
Selective Routing

The actual provider of telephone service and equipment for the PSAP will be selected at a later date.

OPERATIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

Telephone companies can only provide 9-1-1 service by telephone exchanges: therefore, whenever 9-1-1 service is implemented in one county, all residents of communities outside that county but still within that telephone exchange will also receive 9-1-1 service.

For this reason, Public Safety Answering Points will be established in the surrounding counties of Barry, Kalamazoo and VanBuren. These PSAPs will handle calls for service which originate within their specific jurisdiction, and will be specifically named in the final plan, by amendments in the future.

In the Allegan County Emergency Telephone Service District, One PRIMARY Public Service Answering Point (PSAP) located at Allegan County Central Dispatch is being requested. This PSAP will operate 24 hours per day, every day of the year.

The Primary PSAP will be equipped with three (3) dispatch positions. Two primary and one backup position are being requested, so that the loss of one position will not cut the capability of the PSAP by 50%. This would also provide a third position for use during peak activity periods or in the event of a major disaster or occurrence it would afford a third answering point.

In addition, a Back-up PSAP will be selected in the future and named by amendment to this plan. This PSAP will handle any 9-1-1 calls for service which exceed the capability of at the primary PSAP. In the event of equipment failure, the Back-up PSAP would then assume the duties of receiving calls for emergency services within the Allegan County Telephone Service District 9-1-1 system.

Dispatching of police, fire, ambulances and other emergency service providers will be accomplished by either Direct Dispatch or Transfer method. Operation guidelines will be established to insure that the concept of dispatching the closest appropriate unit will be followed.

The necessary costs of upgrading/changing of the communications equipment of agencies not currently conducting operations on the sheriff department's radio frequency will be the responsibility of that agency or the Allegan County Central Dispatch or a combination of both, in the discretion of the county commissioners.

It is requested that all providers of Police, Emergency Medical Services, Fire and rescue services equip their patrol units with radios which are capable of receiving and transmitting on the assigned dispatch frequencies of Allegan County Central Dispatch to facilitate the timely dispatching of calls for service.

Allegan County hereby reserves the right to assess and to seek voter approval to assess operation surcharges upon telephone access lines within its geographical boundaries, or to assess a millage, or a combination of the two to cover emergency telephone operational costs as provided in act 32, as amended, including but not limited to the fees authorized in 1991 PA 196, or to the 16% fee authorized in 1994 PA 29, or as contained in any other amendment to Act 32.

Emergency Service Providers

Dispatchers assigned to the PSAP will be under the direct supervision of Allegan County Central Dispatch according to rules, regulations, labor contracts and operating procedures as established. The Emergency Provider List may be periodically updated with the approval of the Allegan County Central Dispatch Policy Board.

Radio, and telephone equipment, as well as the necessary lighting will be connected to the emergency power generator already in place. Additional Planning will be necessary to provide a UPS power system for the computer aided dispatch equipment with the intent to fully power all PSAP equipment with UPS in the future.

Notice of Exclusion

Pursuant to Public Act 32 of 1986, each public agency within the Emergency Telephone Service District was given (45) days after the receipt of the Tentative Plan to file with the county clerk a "Notice of Exclusion" from the service district. The "Notice of Exclusion" shall be substantially in the form of:

Notice of Intent to Function as a PSAP

Each Public Safety Agency had 45 days after receipt of this Tentative 9-1-1 Service Plan to file with the county clerk a "Notice of Intent to Function as a PSAP" or Secondary PSAP. When a public safety agency files as a PSAP or a Secondary PSAP, they shall file a service plan listing the public agencies for which they will provide 9-1-1 service and the method(s) used for dispatch. See example below:

MANAGERIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Each public agency which decides to operate a PSAP, is responsible for the Management of the on-line public safety dispatch center operations, i.e. operational costs, level of service, equipment needs and personnel needs, etc. Public agencies providing and operating a PSAP, are responsibilities, consistent with the emergency Telephone Service Enabling Act, to assure an appropriate and timely implementation and maintenance of their individual E 9-1-1 PSAP.

It is understood that the rates and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission's (M.P.S.C.) E 9-1-1 tariff now in effect or hereafter established in it's tariffs, as filed with the Michigan Public Service Commission, govern the provisions of E 9-1-1 service by the service suppliers.

9-1-1 Policy Committee

A 9-1-1 Policy Committee will be established according to the By-Laws adopted by the Allegan County Central Dispatch and approved by the Allegan County Board of Commissioners.

This committee will be given the responsibility of resolving any operational problems which may occur. The governing factor in resolving any problem should be service to the public and a spirit of cooperation.

A chair and vice-chairperson will be elected by the members of the committee upon implementation of the service district, The vice-chairperson shall then assume the portion of chairperson the following year when a new vice-chairperson is elected.

Meeting of the board will held at the call of the chairperson or whenever necessary. Any board member can request a special board meeting should a serious matter arise.

A quorum for the conduct of Committee business shall be a majority of the members designated and serving on the Committee.

The Committee shall make recommendations as to the operational procedures of the PSAPs, and resolution of any problem, but shall not have the authority to impose policy statement to the public service agencies within this service district.

FISCAL CONSIDERATIONS

It is required by Act 32 that any 9-1-1 service plan include the projected recurring and non-recurring costs along with a financial plan for implementing and operating the system.

Estimated costs for the Allegan County Emergency Telephone District were computed using the following factors:

1. For technical service charge purposes the highest monthly base rate for a 1-party access line within this district is \$10.66.
2. Implementation costs are capped at 2% of the 1-party line fee.
3. Operational costs are capped at 2% of the 1-party line fee.
4. 2% of the 1-party line fee is \$.2132.

Non-Recurring Charges

A maximum of \$.2132/month can be billed to the user for a period of not more than five years, "Non-Recurring Charges" (NRC). This will offset the costs of start-up, installation, service, and the updating of equipment to the supplier. These costs will be amortized over a five year period and will then be dropped from the user charges.

Monthly Recurring Charges

A maximum of \$.2132/month may be charged to the individual phone customer to pay for "Monthly Recurring Charges" (MRC). This charge will be listed separately in the billing to users and collected by the service supplier. This Charge will continue until such time that there is a change in the service district.

The allowable access fee per user would be \$.4264 per month.

PAYMENTS BY SERVICE SUPPLIERS

Public Act 32 requires that the costs which are incurred for the operations of each PSAP be paid by the controlling agency having such PSAP. This includes, but is not limited to, the purchase, installation, and repairs of equipment.

Each PSAP will be responsible for cost the of personnel who staff the PSAP.

The costs to Allegan County to implement this Emergency Telephone District, will be estimated at \$100,000.00 This would cover the costs of, but not be limited to, PSAP equipment, Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) software, CAD-Telephone Software interface programming, and the remodeling of the dispatch center. Additional operational costs of the PSAP will be reflected annually in the emergency dispatch system budget as approved by the County Board of Commissioner's .

Funding for the 9-1-1 system is being requested from the county commissioners at this time. The availability of State and/or Federal funding and the funding mechanisms available through state statute may also be sought.

It is anticipated that additional staff may be required to staff the communications center upon implementation of this plan.

Estimated date implementation date is 18 to 24 months after the letter of intent is received by the service supplier.

ALLEGAN COUNTY 911 SERVICE PLAN—ADOPT ADMINISTRATIVE FINDINGS

WHEREAS, Allegan County has adopted a Final 911 Service Plan ("Plan") pursuant to the Emergency Telephone Service Enabling Act, 1986 PA 32, as amended ("Act");

WHEREAS, the Plan requires the Board to enact Administrative Findings identifying the telephone service providers facilitating wire-based emergency telephone calls from within the Plan's Service District and public agencies responding to calls for emergency services with the Service District, and the highest monthly flat rate charged by a service supplier for a 1-party access line within the 9-1-1 Service District ("Service District");

WHEREAS, the Federal Communications Commission has issued a wireless emergency service order that requires central dispatch answering centers ("PSAPS") to request deployment of Phase II 911 enhanced services from Commercial Mobile Radio Service ("CMRS") suppliers, which include cellular phone services companies;

WHEREAS, the Board determines that the best way of communicating a request for deployment of Phase II 911 enhanced services from CMRS suppliers is through the coordinating efforts of the Michigan Communication Directors Association;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD HEREBY FINDS that the following is the list of wire-based service suppliers currently facilitating emergency telephone calls from within the Service District:

ALLEGAN COUNTY 911 SERVICE PLAN—ADOPT PLAN AMENDMENT

WHEREAS, Allegan County ("County") has adopted a Final 911 Service Plan ("Plan") pursuant to the Emergency Telephone Service Enabling Act, 1986 PA32, as amended ("Act");

WHEREAS, the Federal Communications Commission has issued a wireless emergency service order that requires central dispatch answering centers ("PSAPS") to request deployment of Phase II 911 enhanced services from Commercial Mobile Radio Service ("CMRS") suppliers, which include cellular phone service companies;

WHEREAS, 1999 PA 78 requires Plans to implement the wireless emergency service Order and the Act, in order to qualify the County for distributions from the CMRS emergency telephone fund administered by the Department of Treasury and also requires a county to distribute all funds received from the CMRS emergency telephone fund to the primary public safety answering points ("PSAP") within the County;

WHEREAS, the list of service suppliers and public agencies involved in emergency calls and service and the highest monthly flat rate charged by a service supplier within the Service District vary from time to time;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the following Final 911 Service Plan Amendment is adopted;

FINAL 911 SERVICE PLAN AMENDMENT

1. The Allegan County Board of Commissioners ("Board") is authorized from time to time to adopt and update the list of service suppliers facilitating wire based emergency service calls, and public agencies providing emergency response services within the Service District. The Board shall also periodically obtain and publish the highest monthly flat rate charged by a service supplier for a 1-part access line within the Allegan County Service District. The Board shall memorialize the updated list of service suppliers, the highest monthly charge and the emergency service providers within the Service District in a set of Administrative Findings.
2. All Commercial Mobile Radio Service ("CMRS") providers are requested and directed to deploy Phase II 911 enhanced service as provided in the wireless emergency service order ("Order"), FCC Docket No. 94-102, adopted June 12, 1996 with an effective date of October 1, 1996.

3. Allegan County Board of Commissioners, as the governing body of the County's Service District, is authorized and directed to take any action necessary to implement the Order, the Emergency Telephone Service Enabling Act, 1986 PA 32, as amended ("Act"), or any other applicable state or federal law existing or subsequently adopted.

4. Allegan County Board of Commissioners is authorized and directed to cooperate with the Telephone, Telegraph, and Radio Emergency Telephone Service Committee or any other state, federal or local body or official authorized to install, operate, modify and maintain universal emergency number services systems, whether land-line, cellular, wireless, digital or radio based.

5. Allegan County Board of Commissioners is authorized and directed to implement, receive and expand, consistent with all applicable laws, any operation surcharges, CMRS service charges, or any funding provided under state or federal law, including but not limited to such fees authorized, imposed, and collected under the Act.


6. This Amendment's provisions are designed to modify, amend, supersede or replace any inconsistent provisions in the

County's Final 911 Service Plan ("Plan"), and to augment, supplement or add to such Plan provisions that are not in any way inconsistent.

7. A final hearing on this Plan Amendment is set for April 27, 2000 and the County Clerk is directed to send a copy of this Plan Amendment to all public agencies and to otherwise make the required postings under the Act.



WHEREAS, the Allegan County Board of Commissioners ("Board") is authorized under Michigan's Emergency Telephone Service Enabling Act, 1986 PA 32, as amended ("Act") and under authority provided by its Emergency Telephone Services Plan ("911 Plan") to make administrative findings regarding among other things, the service suppliers providing 9-1-1 services within the 911 Plan's Service District.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board hereby makes an Administrative Finding that Peninsula Fiber Network, LLC and or its affiliate PFN NextGen 911 Services LLC, shall be the primary 9-1-1 service supplier, employing a common network that enables all other service suppliers within the 911 Plan's Service District to be selectively routed and otherwise access the 9-1-1 system and the primary PSAPs identified in the Plan; and

BE IT RESOLVED, that all service suppliers shall cooperate with Peninsula Fiber Network, LLC or its affiliate PFN NextGen 911 Services LLC in order to facilitate the switchover to its common network, Next Generation Selective Router and other Next Generation 911 services, features and offerings as may be applicable or required herein; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Peninsula Fiber Network, LLC and or its affiliate PFN NextGen 911 Services LLC is authorized and directed to work with the 911 Plan's service suppliers, the Michigan Public Service Commission, State 911 Committee and State 911 Director and any other state, federal or local authority in order to effectuate and implement the provisions of this Administrative Finding, including but not limited to the identification for a specific date and time for the switchover to the Peninsula Fiber Network's or its affiliate's common network; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall augment, supersede, modify or replace any inconsistent prior resolution or motion; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk shall send a copy of this resolution and its Administrative Findings to PFN and to each PSAP for which this finding applies, and emergency service provider as it deems necessary within the County; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Board Chairman and/or the County Administration is authorized to sign all necessary documents to complete this action.
