TUSCOLA COUNTY RESOLUTION 2020-05 RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF LINE 5

WHEREAS, Enbridge's Line 5 has been operating safely and reliably in Michigan for more than 65 years; and

WHEREAS, Enbridge's Line 5, a light crude and natural gas liquids pipeline, helps to safely meet Michigan's energy needs by fulfilling more than half of the propane needs of the state; and

WHEREAS, the products delivered to regional refineries provide jobs and ultimately fuel our lives; and

WHEREAS, multiple and extensive inspections and safety tests over the last several years have confirmed the integrity of Line 5 at the Straits of Mackinac as fit for service; and

WHEREAS, Enbridge has proposed to invest \$500 million to make a safe pipeline safer by placing a tunnel with one-foot-thick concrete walls 100 feet underground and make the chances of a leak into the Straits virtually zero; and

WHEREAS, consequences to energy supply, local producers, regional airports and refineries, jobs, local economies and the pocketbook of Michiganders across the U.P. and the state are too great for Line 5 to be shut down before the tunnel replacement can be completed; and

WHEREAS, Enbridge has demonstrated a willingness to work with the state to both protect the Great Lakes and ensure the continued safe delivery of energy we all rely on.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners extends its support for Enbridge's proposed tunnel replacement project and urges the State of Michigan to work with Enbridge to complete the tunnel project as quickly as possible and not disrupt Line 5 service before the tunnel can be completed.

RESOLUTION TO DECLARE RACISM AS A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS

Introduced by Commissioner Joseph Brehler

Commissioner Brehler moved for the approval of the following resolution. Seconded by Commissioner Haskell.

WHEREAS, race is a social construction with no biologic basis, a social system with multiple dimensions, including individual racism, which is internalized or interpersonal; and

WHEREAS, systemic racism is institutional or structural, a system of structuring opportunity and assigning value based on the social interpretation of how one looks that unfairly disadvantages some individuals and communities, unfairly advantages other individuals and communities, and depletes the strength of the whole society through the waste of human resources; and

WHEREAS, racism is rooted in the foundation of America for more than 400 years. From the time chattel slavery began in the 1600s, to the Jim Crow era, to the declaration of the war on drugs that which has led to the mass incarceration of Black people, racism has remained a presence in American society while subjecting Black people to hardships and disadvantages in every aspect of life; and

WHEREAS, racism, including unconscious and conscious bias, causes persistent racial discrimination in Criminal Justice, Social Capital, Voter Suppression, Education, Transportation, Employment, Food Access, Mental Health and Health Behaviors, Socioeconomic Status, Environmental Exposure, Access to Health Services, and Public Safety; and

WHEREAS, historical racism in Michigan has impacted Black Michiganders including Black Eaton County residents. Discriminatory housing practices in the 20th century, known as redlining, and discriminatory housing covenants contributed to the segregation of the Black community. Black citizens across the state of Michigan have been limited to areas with restricted access to healthy foods, lack of clean water, and other essential resources, leading to a variety of health issues, including reduced life expectancy, higher rates of infant and maternal mortality, and higher rates of lead poisoning; and

WHEREAS, older adults and people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions are at higher risk for severe illness from COVID-19, Black people have higher incidence of chronic illnesses than other races causing them to die from COVID-19 at 3.8 times the rate of white people; and

WHEREAS, Black people are disproportionately suffering in-part due to these long standing, unaddressed health disparities as a result of systemic racism and other socioeconomic inequities. Indicators of health disparities include Black infant mortality, which is 12.9 percent compared to White infant mortality at 6.4 percent; prevalence of diabetes, which is 17.5 percent for Blacks

compared to 7.7 percent for Whites; and 20 percent of Black residents state that they lack access to health care; and

WHEREAS, there is clear data to illustrate that racism negatively impacts the lives of Black people in Eaton County and the privileges that other Americans experience inhibit them from fully understanding how racism impacts Black people in America – for example the performance of simple tasks like driving while Black, walking/running in neighborhoods, wearing a hoodie, going to the store, or just going to a park all come with certain risk not experienced by others. Concerned parents prepare their Black youth at an early age by having "The Talk" with their children in order to attempt to protect them; and

WHEREAS, the American Public Health Association, National Association of County and City Health Officials, and the American Academy of Pediatrics have declared racism as a public health crisis, this Board believes that now is the time to do the same. The disparities caused by racism that we have outlined in this resolution represent a public health crisis which affects us all; and

WHEREAS, we as a governmental body have a responsibility to ensure an optimal quality of life for all of our Black Eaton County residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Eaton County Board of Commissioners hereby declares racism as a public health crisis that affects all members of our society on a local (urban and rural), state, and national level and demands action from all levels of government and society.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Eaton County Board of Commissioners advocates for relevant policies that improve health in the Black community, and support local, state, and federal initiatives that advance social justice.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Eaton County will assess its local ordinances, health regulations and internal policies and procedures to ensure racial equity and promote diversity as core elements in all organizational decision-making.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Eaton County Board of Commissioners calls upon all members of the community to come together to work toward achieving community-oriented solutions to address the legacy of racial injustices faced by Black communities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Board of Commissioners urges other governmental bodies to declare racism as a public health crisis and to immediately take steps to intentionally address and support methods that will strategically reduce the long-term impact of systemic racism.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners requests that the County Clerk forward copies of this resolution to the Governor of the State of Michigan, Eaton County's State Legislative delegation, the Michigan Association of Counties, Barry-Eaton District Health Department, the Michigan Association of Local Public Health, Community Mental Health Authority – Clinton, Eaton and Ingham Counties, the Community Mental Health Association of Michigan and local units of government within Eaton County. Carried.

WHEREAS, this action may very well provide unintended consequences for all parties as the litigation to close down Line 5 may take years to be resolved in the courts with no assurance of the outcome; and

WHEREAS, the time to resolve the litigation may simply result in the delay of the start of the construction of the tunnel thereby leaving the existing Line 5 in place unnecessarily for several additional years.

WHEREAS, Enbridge has demonstrated a willingness to work with the state to both protect the Great Lakes and ensure the continued safe delivery of energy we all rely on.



Probate Court Authority

Article VI Section 15 of the Michigan Constitution provides that "the jurisdiction, powers and duties of the probate court and of the judges thereof shall be provided by law." Through the promulgation of the Estates and Protected Individuals Code (EPIC), the Mental Health Code, and other acts, the legislature has conferred jurisdiction to the Probate Court over:

- Delayed Registration of Foreign Births


Changes at the Court




In November of 2019, Avery Rose left his position as Probate Administrator and Register to accept the Probate Administrator position for the Kent County Probate Court. Avery gave years of dedicated service to the Allegan Probate Court, Circuit Court, Family Court, and was an invaluable asset to the community as a whole. The Court is sincerely grateful for the years of service and incredible kindness Avery showed this community.

Avery was replaced by Jonathan K. Blair in November of 2019. At the time Jonathan was an assistant prosecutor with the Allegan Prosecutor's office, had previously owned his own practice, and had clerked for the 48th Circuit Court.

Probate Court Caseload



In 2019 there were a total of 750 new and pending cases handled by the Probate Court, the majority of which were comprised of decedents' estates (181), mental health proceedings (212), adult guardianships (132), and minor guardianships (95).




Caseload Trends

2018 and 2019 had the same case load numbers. In prior years, the caseload had been consistently rising (notwithstanding the decreases in overall caseload in 2009 and 2016). There were 578 new and pending cases handled by the Court in 2008 and 750 in 2018 and 2019, which represents a 30% increase in overall caseload. Most notably, since 2011 the number of adult guardianship cases handled by the Court has increased from 70


to 132, a 47% increase. During the same time new mental health filings have increased by 42%.

Expenditures

Below is a chart showing the allocated operational budget for the Probate Court, actual expenditures, revenues budgeted, and the actual revenues collected from 2010 to 2019. Since 2010, the Court was allocated an average annual operational budget of \$99,281. During that same period, the Court spent an average of \$90,481 per year.



During the same period, since 2010, the cost per case has decreased from \$181 per case to \$119.87 per case.



Attorney and GAL Fees



Attorney fees continue to be the single largest expenditure for the Court. In 2010 the Court expended \$14,068 on attorney and GAL fees. In 2019 that cost was \$25,154 – a 79% increase. However, the services provided by the GALs and attorneys are invaluable to the Court and public. The Court could not function without these individuals and often they provide necessary services to the community's most at-risk individuals. While the overall cost is high, the amount paid to each individual is relativity low.

Attorney Fee Recovery for Mental Health Proceedings

Last year the Court began utilizing a free online accounting tool geared toward small businesses called **Wave**. This website has assisted the Court in generating and tracking invoices for reimbursement of the attorney fees it pays in connection with mental health proceedings. The Court successfully collected a total of \$4,053.25 in 2018 and \$4,623.42 in 2019. However, for 2020 collections have slowed due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Revenues

Most of the Probate Court's revenues are dependent on filing fees and requests for copies, during the past five years the Court has collected an average of \$38,151.32 per year, and exceeded the average amount it has budgeted for revenue collection over that period of time, which was \$36,638.89.

Court's professional guardian reimbursement program.

Since 2017 the Court and community have benefited from the funding the County provides for its professional guardian reimbursement program. This allows guardians to be reimbursed up for \$60 per month per ward for services provided. Without these services professional guardians (and thus any guardian) would be unavailable for a number of wards. In 2019 six guardian services were able to use the program to provide for 42 wards. This has increased to 45 in 2020.

Probate and the Pandemic

Although this report's focus is on 2019, it would be a disservice to the Court's staff not to address the 2020 COVID-19 Pandemic. Since the Pandemic struck, the Court has thankfully remained open for business. The Court has continued to manage an almost complete caseload with some minimal understandable delays.

The Court's continued operation is due to the dedication and work ethic of its staff. Staff has rotated at-home work with necessary in-office work while limiting exposure to other staff and the public. Thankfully all Probate Court staff have stayed healthy, but plans are in place for any eventuality. The flexibility and absolute commitment that the Probate staff has shown during these hard times is remarkable. The citizens of Allegan County benefit from their commitment.

2018 Public Satisfaction Survey

Every two years the Probate Court distributes a public satisfaction survey to the public, in



coordination with the Circuit and District Courts. The survey is developed by the State Court Administrative Office, and assists the Probate Court in identifying its strengths, providing positive feedback to employees, and targeting areas for improvement.

In the Court's last survey, 100% of court users agreed or strongly agreed that they were treated with courtesy and respect by court staff. Court users also overwhelmingly indicated that they

were able to get their business done in a reasonable amount of time and that their cases were handled fairly.

Annual Update to the Allegan County Commission July 9, 2020

Our Mission

Strengthening our community by improving and advocating for the lives of individuals and families.

Our Vision

Building a community which provides integrated behavioral health care effectively, efficiently, and sustainably for all who require it.

Our Core Values

Integrity, Honor, Equality, Innovation, Teamwork, Cultural Competency. Thank you, Commissioners and Administrator Sorro, for the opportunity to present this annual update from Allegan County Community Mental Health. Ordinarily I would have relished the opportunity to share a clever PowerPoint presentation with you, but the times call for a more standard written report that can be more easily delivered at a distance.

I'd like to share with you several updates and developments related to our work, and close by inviting you to find a way to celebrate with us in this very special – though unusual – year.

COVID-19

As we are all too painfully aware, the onset of the COVID-19 crisis has thrown a giant curve ball at every kind of business and enterprise in the county, and CMH is no exception. Ever since the initiation of Governor Whitmer's "Stay Home, Stay Safe" order on 3/24/2020, we have been working to figure out a new way to continue our work with the people we serve.

- We went from being an office-based crew to a largely off-site crew.
- We secured additional technology (phones and computers) and adopted virtual meeting platforms for our meetings and secure versions for our client contacts.
- We supported our staff by offering "Administrative Leave" time for those unable to do their work and have seen that time diminish a lot over the six or seven payroll periods that have transpired since March.
- We provided each staff with a daily email update on agency activities to keep everyone in the loop. As of 6/30/2020, we're up to edition #68 having throttled back to 2x/week now.
- We consult regularly and in an ongoing manner with many different partners:
 - o Locally with the Allegan County Health Department
 - o Regionally with the Lakeshore Regional Entity
 - Statewide with the MI Dept of Health and Human Services
- We participated faithfully in the coordinating activities of the Emergency Operations Center.
- We have enjoyed the continued support of our board which, thanks to your recent actions – have filled all twelve seats with outstanding community representatives, including three of your Commissioners – Chairperson Jim Storey, Mark DeYoung, Gale Dugan – all of whom have been excellent in their service.

Based on a survey conducted in May, the experience of our clients to all the telehealth offerings has been mixed. Some find it convenient and a practical help to their transportation challenges. Some miss the in-person interaction, and/or have technology problems or limitations that makes it impractical. I suspect we will work to maintain it where it works and is preferred and revert to in-person services as soon as our plan permits for those who do not prefer that mode of delivery.

We cannot predict the path or timeline of the crisis but are doing our part to keep it as short as possible by keeping everyone as safe as possible.

NEW BUILDING

We are in the lengthy process of purchasing and eventually refurbishing the former Shopko store on Jenner Drive across from Ascension Allegan Hospital. We have already gone many rounds with our USDA mortgage application to conform it to their fluctuating documentation requirements. We think we are close to the end of their process and will be able to proceed to construction and build-out phases after that.

All architectural and financial feasibility work for the building is complete, as it had to be submitted with the USDA application. The building will house all our current operations and allow for near-term expansion to include integrated physical and behavioral healthcare as well as increased capacity for the treatment of substance use disorders. We have a dire need to offer an in-county option for people with opioid and methamphetamine dependence.

If all goes well, and we secure the USDA's commitment by September, we could be on track to move the entire CMH operation into the Shopko location sometime in late 2021. I'm grateful to Rob Sarro and his team for their support in planning. We anticipate continuing our partnership through the county for a number of services in the new location.

FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN

Mental health is such an important community concern, touching on every aspect of life for most of our community members. Mental Health America reports that nationally between 2012 and 2017,

- youth major depression increased from 8.66% to 13.01%
- only 28.2% of these youth received consistent care
- adult serious suicidal ideation increased from 3.77% to 4.19%
- more individuals have private health insurance but 8.1% did not have mental health coverage (up from 4.6% in 2012)

People are concerned for themselves and for their family members and neighbors. One way the community can help is by responding to a special one-time campaign for financial support. The proceeds of that campaign will give county residents and business leaders a tangible way to support the community by making it possible for Allegan County CMH to locate our services in a highly visible, strategic and accessible location for years to come.

MODERNIZING OUR IDENTITY

The past couple of years have been spent evaluating the strategic needs of the organization and our mission/vision/values have been revised (see page 1, left column). What started as an effort to bring citizens home from institutional care and integrate them into community life in the 1970's has shifted. We continue to work to help everyone who struggles with chronic mental illness or developmental/intellectual disabilities achieve a full and rich life in their community.

However, we do so much more to intervene in mental health crises as they happen, we serve in support of courts and the jail as they deal with individuals with mental illness, we facilitate access to addiction treatment and offer recovery supports, we address childhood trauma and behavioral difficulties that emerge in childhood and we support healthy living and positive development for youth. ACCMHS is the homelessness go-to agency for Allegan County.

In the next several months, we will consider options for rebranding/renaming the agency. "Community Mental Health" services are our roots, but this name can stand in the way of how the public understands our services. We look to increase accurate interaction with an agency with strong skills in behavioral health that is dynamically engaged with the larger health care system, and which offers many other resources to support success and well-being.

STRATEGIC DISCUSSION

On August 11, our board and key partners (architect, branding consultant, fund developer) will come together for a work session to consider how we can bring all of these elements together – building, branding, & bucks – amid the COVID-19 crisis. Our cause is noble, and our work is challenging, and what it means to this community is what drives our daily efforts.

FIFTY YEARS

I know, we don't look a day over 35. But CMH was born on July 1, 1970! I spent a lot of time all through 2019 digging through archives of board minutes and agency archives and old newspaper articles about everything that happened in those 50 years. There is so much to remember and appreciate. Unfortunately, COVID-19 sunk our plans for a collective event – but someday, when this is all done, we will do just that. We will remember our past together and with humility commit ourselves to a future of great service to the people of Allegan County.
